### FROM OUR MINISTER

*"All the world's a stage/And all the men and women merely players." – As You Like It*

This quote comes to mind to me, your interim minister, as I celebrate with you the news that the Mid-Columbia UU Fellowship is bringing a candidate for settled minister to the gorge later this month. This is an exciting time, the beginning of many new relationships and possibilities, the culmination of much hard work and faith. It is also a time when the interim minister takes a step back on the stage and begins to prepare his exit. I'm not taking my bow just yet, for there is much work to do to complete the transition to a new settled minister, but I know the spotlight will be shining on a new and promising presence for professional UU ministry here in the gorge. It is an exciting prospect—and a time ripe with possibilities.

Perhaps, though, that is only one stage in this world—the stage we create as a congregation. The stages that are our real lives—or perhaps Shakespeare was wrong and our lives are not really

stages after all, in which case I'd just say our real lives—go on as before. The Search Team has done tremendous work—and done so under a fairly well-prescribed structure and process (some may accuse me of being diplomatic here). I can think of very few other venues outside of professional sports in which such a fixed structure exists outside of denominational clergy settlements. (I'm sure there are many, but it's one of the few I've had direct experience with.) Every UU congregation, of course, is free to call anyone it wants to be its minister, but we have chosen to work with this process because it is important to us to maintain a solid identity as a Unitarian Universalist congregation. The structure that we've worked with has been honed over decades of “settlement” practices that are what they are because we want the flexibility to choose among the widest number of candidates as possible. Yet we want to be sure all candidates have a basic understanding of what it means to serve a congregation wanting to maintain this identity. Of course, the “UU World” is a relatively small one, so it helps to have everyone working on the same page, as it were.

So take a minute in the next couple of weeks, while we're preparing the spotlight for that new presence on our stage, to thank the members of the Search Team. They've given us a great gift.
